## Methodology

Each year, Students Run LA (SRLA) collects graduation information on its senior class.

On March 8, 2020, 618 SRLA seniors completed the 2020 Los Angeles Marathon. Just five days later, on March 13th, the Superintendent of Los Angeles Unified School District announced that students would no longer be attending school in person. Charter school organizations and private schools made similar decisions.

As a result, SRLA relied solely on seniors completing the SRLA Senior Survey online. A unique link was sent to each senior that included a personalized survey that asked questions about plans after high school and how those plans may have changed as a result of the COVID-19 health crisis.

Because SRLA could not ask teachers to follow up with their students in-person, the response rate to the SRLA Senior Survey this year (76.5\%) was significantly down as compared to last year (97.4\%). Nonetheless, the SRLA Senior Survey results provide a good snapshot on the plans of SRLA seniors before and after the COVID-19 health crisis.

## Overall Statistics <br> SRLA Class of 2020

Historically, SRLA has reported a 99\% graduation rate with $95 \%$ of those graduates having plans to attend college in the fall. The expectations of SRLA seniors before the COVID-19 health crisis closely match these historical results.

The COVID-19 health crisis disrupted life for everyone in Los Angeles. SRLA surveyed the Class of 2020 between April and early June 2020 when many colleges had not yet announced their plans for the fall semester. Not surprisingly, the number of seniors still planning to attend college in the fall dropped; however, the percentage of students who reported to be among the first-generation in their families to go to college largely remained the same. More than $5 \%$ of students reported being uncertain of their post-high school plans.

## Statistics by Gender SRLA Class of 2020

Historically, female SRLA seniors report plans to attend college at higher rates than their male peers. In 2019, nearly 98\% of SRLA female graduates reported having plans to attend college as compared to just $90 \%$ of male graduates. Once again, a larger percentage of SRLA women than men report plans to attend college. Similarly, a larger percentage of women than men report being among the first-generation of their families to attend college.

It appears, however, that the COVID-19 health crisis had a greater impact on the college plans of SRLA female graduates. A larger number of women than men are no longer planning to attend college. Before the COVID-19 health crisis, 227 female seniors had plans to attend college but, now, only 211 plan to attend. In contrast, the number of male seniors planning to attend college dropped by only 2.

It appears that the COVID-19 health crisis had a greatest impact on the plans of Latinx students, with more than 30 students no longer having plans to attend college. As Latinx students make up the largest cohort of SRLA students, this is not a surprising result.

As reported above, the number of seniors still planning to attend college in the fall dropped as a result of COVID-19; however, the percentage of students who reported to be among the first-generation in their families to go to college largely remained the same across all demographics.
